

# 2019 Annual Report

**Mission:** To provide children & young adults with special needs and injured armed forces personnel, active duty and veterans in rehabilitation, the opportunity to achieve a sense of freedom, accomplishment, and increased self-esteem while giving their families hope through the use of Equine Assisted Activities and Therapies.

## Year in review:

- Year 1 in our brand new indoor arena! With the arena being completed at the end of 2018, we were able to start using the indoor for classes all year round. We began with a pilot winter program, and then began spring classes on time and without too many layers to keep warm. During the summer months we were able to keep cool during classes by the ceiling fans, and in the fall the 7 pm class was never left in the dark.
- We enjoyed a fantastic fundraiser at Canterbury again for our 5th "Day at the Races" and our first event utilizing our indoor arena—we had FunFest with the Teddy Bear Band! Thanks to our fantastic sponsors for these events. Our weekend at VonHanson's was beautiful weather and we had some wonderful folks donate to the November Give to the Max Minnesota.
- We had horses Khan and Shooter join our program this year. They began
  with the Children's Program and have expanded into our Heroes on
  Horseback Program.

We offered classes to riders throughout the 7 county metro area, but 94% lived in the cities south of the Minnesota River. Of those cities, the top 3 are:

Lakeville (27%) Apple Valley (16%) Eagan (9%)

## Statistics for 2019

This year we had <u>82</u> participate in our riding classes and we had <u>21</u> participants in the Horse Sense Psychotherapy classes.

54 participants were male & 49 were female.

While over 43 different diagnoses were present in our riders, below are the 4 that affected many of those that participated.

- 1. Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD)
- 2. Developmental Delay (DD)
- Attention deficit disorder / Attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADD/ ADHD)
- 4. Cerebral palsy (CP)

Our Riders started as young as 4 years and went into their 20's.

3%	under 5 years old
35%	between 6 & 10 years
50%	between 11 & 18 years
12%	over 10 years.

## **Program Highlights:**

- Classes once again began in May and ran through the end of October.
- We were able to cancel less classes because of weather by utilizing our indoor arena. The temperature was generally warmer in the spring and fall, cooler in the summer (sometimes almost 10 degrees!), and the wind was rarely a concern to our horses or riders. We did have to cancel classes due to severe weather alerts, and we implemented our severe weather / tornado alert policy for the first time ever—where we waited out the storm in the stall portion of the arena until it was safe to drive. What an adventure! We had brave riders and volunteers that night!

## Heroes on Horseback Veteran's Program

- Our new instructor Shanelle taught our veterans utilizing both the indoor and outdoor arenas as well as the portions of our riding trails that were not underwater.
- Program horses Shooter, Marshall, and Roxy joined in helping out Liberty, Zeus, Caleb, Della, and Princess with our Military Riders.
